
The President's Thoughts **Communication**

Sometimes the obvious is overlooked. I look back at the early well drilling machines. They were a real engineering marvel. **Keystones** were a very popular brand made in the 30's, 40's and 50's and seemed to be a little clumsy and a little too heavy. **Bucyrus-Erie** took over

that industry in the 1950's. Those machines were more condensed in the design, as well as the weight. They provided quick set up, usually by 1 man, and most had a 3rd line for casing or lifting heavy bits. The downfall was that they didn't improve the design throughout the years. They never listened to the drillers' requests. Gravity on the drill stem couldn't get quicker or be made more efficient, so often, production didn't increase drastically, since the early rigs were made; 8-10 feet in very hard rock to as much as 50-60 feet a day in soft shales. And it is still the same today.

Then came the rotary era in the late 50's. Mud drilling, air rotary rigs were on the way into the drilling industry. Table drive rigs were popular; then someone engineered top head drive rigs. TriCone bits got replaced by down-the-hole hammers and hammer bits. Small engines got to be larger horsepower and stronger hydraulics to aid in rotation and pull back, as well as having more CFM and PSI capacity on the in-board compressors. This increased productivity drastically. Hammers got more efficient as well as the carbide and bit designs. Don't forget the mud, chemistry improvements for drilling over burden, those improvements enable us to drill deeper and safer in overburden and to keep circulation.

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The production and speed of the hydraulics is way faster now than from the early years, or even 30 years ago. The carriers are a dream to drive now, over 275hp motors that were popular in the 60's and 70's. It's not uncommon to carry 500' of rod and 3 hammers on a rig also.

This is due to rig manufacturers listening to drillers and their requests to make the job easier and more efficient to get the well done.

I credit this to the way our country mechanized after WWII and especially after the 1950's. Engineering of machines really took off with automobiles, excavating and industrial machines.

The well drillers had a little better education than the generation before. Look at how many drillers were pilots or in the air force in the Korean War and had planes after they made their way to success in the drilling business. It made our manpower more industrious. Yes, they had more opportunities, but they tried different ways to make a machine more efficient because they were open to new ideas and wanted to be more productive.

I guess my opinion is that whenever we go to a show, meeting, convention, we leave with something new in our minds. And occasionally the manufacturers listen, and they learn what we want or take our suggestions back to their people.

We might never have the perfect rig, water truck, pump hoist, up-z-dazy, etc. But the more we communicate the better our industry and will be.

Twenty years ago, I asked a well-known salesman, "Why doesn't your rig have 4 jacks instead of 3?" His reply was "A milking stool only has 3 legs, why does a rig need 4 jacks?" That manufacturer is now almost out of business. After about 10 years they started putting 4 jacks on their rigs. Yeah, much more stable and safer, as well as height on the front end is greater.

Don't believe that anyone knows it all. But, when we communicate in our industry, we all learn.

Have a safe and prosperous summer. Don't forget the suntan lotion and don't overlook the obvious.

Points can be accrued by the following methods:


- 1. Groundwater related conventions/ expositions/meetings one point per day.



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
















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From NGWA's Safety Talks and The Hartford

Safe driving of powered industrial trucks leaves no room for the amateur. People who make their living behind the wheel know and practice safety. They know their jobs, their equipment, and their responsibilities – if not, they're soon out of work.

Let's look at some of the basic safety practices that separate the professional from the amateur.

The Professional.....

- Makes sure the truck is ready for a day's work.
 A complete check is made and any malfunction or poor truck performance is brought to the supervisor's attention immediately.
- Makes sure the truck is given regular maintenance.
- Is serious when it comes to refueling never leaves the truck running, doesn't smoke, watches for spills and cleans them up.

The Professional – Truck and Load......

- Backs down inclines goes forward up inclines.
- Doesn't travel with the load elevated, keeps the load stable and as close to the floor as possible.
- Avoids raising or lowering a load while the truck is moving and always keeps the load tilted back toward the carriage while raising and lowering.

- Makes sure the load is balanced and is within the capacity of the truck.
- Keeps the truck forks spread as wide as possible.
- Never uses the forks as a personnel elevator unless properly equipped.


The Professional Driver.....

- Always makes sure the way is clear.
- Obeys the rules of the road.
- Slows down for corners, blind spots, and doorways.
- Drives defensively always watching for the unexpected.
- · Never tries to turn on an incline.
- Crosses tracks diagonally and slows down for uneven floors and surfaces.
- Keeps legs, arms, feet, hands and head inside the truck.
- Stays out from under forks and loads.
- Never shows off! Never gives anyone a ride.

Safety "by the seat of the pants" is not efficient. Powered industrial truck operators must learn and practice safe driving.



Albert H. Mack Scholarship Guidelines
