Public Information: No report given at this time.



association in this direction.


The membership are free to also comment and can send their comments to Julie at jewels2564@aol.com and she





## Inland Marine & What You Should Know

What is inland marine? Inland marine is a specialized form of property insurance designed for property that is moveable. It covers business personal property and equipment when it is located aways from your business locations. It is sometimes referred to as an equipment floater. Inland marine is derived from ocean marine insurance but adapted for land-based risk.

Key features of an inland marine policy cover many items. First is contractors' equipment which can include drill rigs, pump hoists, rig tenders, water trucks, excavators, pump puller and more. It is any mobile equipment you would use on the job site. It includes installation of floater coverage which includes items that become part of the finished job and turned over to the owner on completion of the job for example: well pump and well casing. Inland marine can include leased or rented equipment for coverage of physical damage. Some inland marine policies, for example Liberty Mutual's policy covers glass. Carefully, read your inland marine policy to see if small tools or your employee's tools are covered if stolen from a jobsite.

Also, inland marine coverage can include business income. If you purchase business income coverage and have a loss to a scheduled item while that item is being repaired or replaced, you can apply for loss of business income.

Why do contractors need inland marine coverage? Contractors often move equipment between sites which increase their risks. It protects owners against theft, damage and loss of tools and equipment. The benefit of inland marine coverage provides financial protection and business continuity if there is a loss.

Common risks that are covered by most inland marine policies include theft, vandalism, fire, transportation accidents, down the hole, and more. You should read your coverage carefully since all policies are not the same.

When choosing your inland marine policy, what should you consider? Inventory your equipment includes what equipment is regularly transported to the jobsite or taken off premises. Evaluate the value of your equipment by looking at both replacement cost and actual cash or market value. Are you covered underground? Does your coverage cover mobility equipment including the chassis? Also, does your policy cover property if it is waterborne? If your rig goes on a barge, are you covered?



## **Pedestrian Safety**

From NGWA Safety Facts Sheets

You're a stranger in your own town when you've been away a long time or when you're in an unfamiliar area. This is true on the job, too. You work in a certain area and when it's necessary to go to another department, or another part of the building, you're in strange territory. Not that you can't find your way around, but it's how you find your way around that might cause problems.

Let's say you're a machine operator and you've worked at your job for a considerable length of time. However, when you leave your machine, you're no longer an operator – you're a pedestrian.

Off the job, when you're a pedestrian, you dodge automobiles and bicycles and watch for open utility holes. When you're on the job, the list of potential dangers is different, but the necessary precautions are the same – you have to stay alert and keep your eyes open.

A walk through the plant should be rather uneventful, but the situation can change in a hurry if you don't stay alert. This is particularly true for employees leaving their own areas or departments.

As a new employee, you were given instructions about your job and these instructions included safety precautions. However, when you go to another area, it can be a new ball game. Operations may be different, equipment may be different and, no doubt, safety precautions will vary too.

So, before entering another area, familiarize yourself with any special rules or procedures necessary for your safety. This might mean you will have to wear special personal protective equipment or observe certain regulations concerning your actions.

While traveling as a pedestrian, always use the regular routes. Walk – don't run. Be on your guard at corners and when you're near machinery, and watch for power trucks and hand trucks on the move. Although truck operators have their own safety rules to follow, which include watching for pedestrians, don't take anything for granted. Be ready to move.

It's a good habit to look both ways before stepping out into an aisle. Wherever there is floor space large enough for a truck, this type of traffic could be moving at you. Don't try to beat an oncoming truck. You might misjudge its speed or slip and fall in front of it. Don't walk while you're looking in another direction – you could bump into another employee or a machine. If you can't watch while you're walking, stop until you can.

When using a stairway, take advantage of the handrails. Some people feel that handrails are just for the aged and handicapped. Well, you can become aged and handicapped fast if you fall down stairs.

Slipping and tripping hazards are additional things to watch for. Misplaced tools, pieces of metal, or other materials will send daydreamers sprawling, despite all efforts to keep floors and aisles clear of these dangers.

Another point I'd like to stress – don't take shortcuts regardless of how tempting they are. There are good reasons why shortcuts are shortcuts and not regular approved routes. Most likely, these reasons are concerned with safety. Shortcut safety applies around conveyors too. Cross conveyors only by the bridges provided for the purpose or at passages.

A word of caution about loading docks and other elevations. Obviously, the quickest way to get to the floor from an elevator is to fall or jump. But, the safest way is to use appropriate ladders or steps.

At times, it's necessary to restrict admittance to certain areas. The restrictions may be temporary or permanent, but whichever it is, don't enter restricted areas unless authorized to do so. These areas will be posted.

I've tried to cover a few of the more important points of pedestrian safety, but people on the move are exposed to many types of conditions and circumstances. So, remember these basic precautions – stay alert – watch for moving equipment – keep your eyes open for slipping and tripping hazards – stay out of restricted areas – use handrails – and don't jump off loading docks or from elevations.



## **OSHA Updates**

What is risk management? Risk management is trying to control or prevent risks. Trying to prevent harm to reputation, personnel, business, and finances. OSHA has had some changes this year which include heat safety rule change, head protections, Haz communications, and electronic reporting for over 100 employees.

**Heat Safety Rule:** *It is a commonsense rule.* Employers must beware of the temperature and provide cooling off locations to employees, for example air-conditioned trucks or tents for shade. Employers are also encouraged to rotate out employees and provide heat protection, clothes, or hats. Provided written procedures and verbalize them to your employees regarding hydration and cooling off. It is the responsibility of the employer to make sure employees act responsibly. This is the new area of OSHA will be targeting.

**Head Protection:** Thou Shall Wear Head Protection – hard hats are not a choice. ANSI has revised the hard hat for side impacts which look more like climber or bicycle hats and have a chin strap. As employers, the document that you provide and give verbal and written warnings to your employees regarding wearing hard hats. The old-style hard hats will still work. The only way to protect yourself against unavoidable employee misconduct is to document yourself as an employer. It can be as simple as recording it on the phone.

PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder): Employees can now file for PTSD. It was only for first responders now it is for all employees who witness or perceive any traumatic situation. This is related to New York State. It can be for stress only though it must be extraordinary and is not defined in New York State. In New York, the court must decide. How do we protect ourselves against this? Be in touch with employees. If you see a potential workplace violence possibility, be interactive with employees and stay in touch with employees. If you have to go to court, you should have the best practices documented. This is new this year. PTSD is covered as a workers' compensation claim.


If you are concerned about not managing this type of situation correctly, reach out to Gallagher for assistance. There is also Employment Practice Liability Insurance available to help cover litigation costs if being sued for wrongful termination.


Fall Protection/Arrest Equipment or Workers' Compensation Exposure Above the ground by four feet, you must have fall protection or fall arrest equipment such as guard rails or harness. That is an OSHA regulation. If you fall from a box 12 inches above the ground. It is not OSHA regulation. But that person will have a WC claim and a New York labor law claim. What is a NY labor law claim? It allows an employee to sue for pain and suffering. It is the result of the NY Scaffolding Law. So, when we are subcontracted for a job, but if we sign a hold harmless to get paid. If one of our employees is hurt, they are not suing the general contractor, they will end up suing you, their employer. It will then impact on your general liability insurance.

If there is a potential for a fall, what are you doing to prevent? Correct the employee and provide them with the correct equipment.

Be aware of your liabilities. **Be safe on PURPOSE!**



- Preference to be given to students attending minimum of a 2-year program
- · Persons may make applications to the scholarship committee only after acceptance at an accredited school.
- Funds may be distributed to more than one person in any one calendar year.
- Application deadline is April 1st of each year.

- Applicants are selected via a blind selection process.
- The number of scholarships and the amount of the scholarship are at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee and cannot exceed a total
  - of \$1000 per calendar year.


